




Our Survey Found That




457 respondents felt that there was not enough awareness of Widening Access



Only 92 of our respondents felt that the measures for Widening Access were adequate

Support Needed to Access Careers



of our respondents said that 'limited opportunities' made it increasingly difficult to get work experience.

52.9%

of respondents said they wanted more work experience to support them entering the healthcare sector.





Facing Young People



Work Experience Barriers

Our young people listed:

- Limited Opportunities
- Age
- Finances



As the **main barriers** which faced young people trying to access work experience in the healthcare sector.



52.9% of respondents said that they wanted more support when accessing work experience.

30.2% of young people who took our survey noted that they had been unable to find **any** opportunities in the healthcare sector.

OUR YOUNG PEOPLE SAID...

"PEOPLE WHO ARE JUST ABOVE THE THRESHOLD OF WIDENING PARTICIPATION CRITERIA ARE AS DISADVANTAGED AS PEOPLE BELOW THE THRESHOLD, THERE SHOULD BE MORE OPPORTUNITIES."

"PEOPLE AREN'T PRIVILEGED ENOUGH TO ACCESS ALL OPPORTUNITIES BUT AREN'T DEPRIVED ENOUGH TO QUALIFY FOR WIDENING ACCESS."

Young people identified numerous underrepresented groups in our survey, including:

Young Carers


Single Parent Households

Mental Health Conditions

Ethnic Minorities

Disabilities and Chronic Illnesses

Young people noted that widening access eligibility criteria should become more nuanced to support a wider range of applicants access the healthcare sector.



It was highlighted in numerous responses, that young people who just surpassed the threshold for widening access were still disadvantaged in their applications.






With 45.7% of applicants learning about Widening Access through social media, universities and UCAS should utilise this tool.

FORWARDS

73.8% said that not enough awareness had been raised, so using social media to give clear information will inevitably help prospective candidates
